Polycystic kidney disease – cyst rupture

Q2: What investigations would you like to order?

- USS of the kidneys
- FBC + Urine dipstick for potential infection/UTI
- U&Es for renal function

Q3: What is your management of this condition?

- Analgesia
- Specialist referral for Tolvaptan
- Genetic counselling and screening of family members
- MRI angiogram for intracranial aneurysms
- Lifestyle advice for example avoiding contact sports
